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PREFACE

This little Concordance of the names and titles of our Divine Lord will be valued by Bible students; for it supplies a real want. When writing the book to which the Introductory Chapter refers, I felt the need of such a Concordance, and my task was greatly facilitated by being supplied with a MS. copy of the present work. And if I refused to avail myself of permission kindly offered me to incorporate it in the Appendix to my own book, it was because my appreciation of its value made me press for the publication of it in a separate form.

It is an extraordinary fact that even in this twentieth century of the Christian era, we are still without a New Testament Concordance of phrases. If, therefore, we wish to make a comparative study of the passages in which, ex. gr., "Eternal life," or "children of God" occur, we must enter on the preliminary task of framing a list with the help of an ordinary Concordance. And this is the more strange because of the amazing care and labour that have been devoted to the preparation of Concordances. That which lies before me as I write—a book of more than 1800 large and closely-printed pages—contains a complete list of "passages in which a few unimportant particles are found." One hundred and twenty pages of the work are thus devoted to matter that is absolutely worthless; for these and's, but's,

for's, of's, &c., have often no counterpart whatever in the original text. And a moiety of the time and labour spent on this perfectly useless work would have sufficed to supply us with a much needed Concordance of phrases.

The student who knows where to look for them can find lists of the passages where certain of the Lord's names and titles are used. But I do not know of any lists that are complete, or that give the particulars that are here supplied. The presence or absence of the Greek article, for example, may help us to understand the significance of His titles as used in various passages. Here, moreover, we need to take account of the Revised Text. And this is shown at a glance in the present work.

Even those who study the New Testament merely as "literature" will not deem details of this kind unimportant. And the hold it has upon the minds even of men who reject its spiritual teaching is strikingly exemplified by the recent publication of a Jewish commentary on "The Synoptic Gospels"—an event without a parallel in the history of the Jewish people during all the Christian centuries.

And by no one are its intensely human qualities more prized than by those who reverence it as Divine. And in our day its Divine character has been newly accredited by the triumphs of missionary work in heathen lands. In many parts of "Darkest Africa," and in islands of the Pacific, which within living memory were peopled by naked savages, sunk in the lowest degradation of paganism, peaceful and happy communities of Christians exist to-day. This is neither poetry nor fiction. The facts are matter of public knowledge. How can they be accounted for?

European civilisation? Such an answer would be strangely

unintelligent. In the opinion of competent observers the immediate effect of introducing Western civilisation into savage heathendom is that the natives assimilate all its vices. Civilisation does not turn cannibals into Christians. It cannot change the hearts of men. If appeal be made to those whose labours have led to these marvellous results, they will testify with united voice that "the Word of God written" has been the power to which alone they can be ascribed. And let us not forget that they are results that have no parallel even in the Apostolic records, for the Book of the Acts makes no mention of evangelistic effort among savage tribes.

While, therefore, in the universities of Christendom the Bible is now disparaged by men who make it the subject of academic study, it is accredited, as never before, by the triumphs of the mission-field. And those who will bring to bear upon the sacred page the microscope, not of academic criticism, but of spiritual research, will ever find new proofs of its Divine authorship.

The words of God, like the works of God, often need a microscopic study to enable us to appreciate them. This is strikingly exemplified by the Scriptural use of the Lord's names and titles. In human speech and writing, accident or euphony, caprice or rhythm, seems to decide in what way the Lord shall be designated, but in Holy Scripture there is always a special fitness, and often a doctrinal significance, in the choice of the name or title employed. And as I have sought to show in the book above referred to, our neglect of all this is apt to betray us into giving a meaning which is at least inadequate, if not wholly false, to such familiar phrases as "the only begotten Son," "the Son of Man," "the

Son of God," &c. &c. And truth of principal importance may thus be perverted or lost.

For while "onlybegotten" is etymologically the equivalent of the Greek monogenes, the use of that word in Scripture gives proof that our English term misleads us as to its real significance. And this error may blind us to the fact that in claiming to be "the Son of God" the Lord Jesus implicitly asserted His Deity. Then, again, the use of "Son of Man" in the New Testament refutes the common error of explaining that title by reference to the Lord's human birth.

I will only add that all who have sufficient spiritual intelligence to appreciate the interest and importance of studies of this kind will value the help afforded by Miss Habershon's book.

INTRODUCTION

When we place under the lens of the microscope anything that has come from the hand of God, we find that it bears magnifying. The higher the power of our instrument the greater the wonders shown. We may look at something which to the natural eye seems uninteresting and void of beauty, but the more we examine it in the microscope the more are we convinced of our mistake.

The same is true of the Word of God. It will bear the very closest scrutiny; and as we reverently study it, and one portion after another comes within our field of vision, we find that new beauties are discoverable.

Mere lists of texts may seem dry and unattractive, although they may be acknowledged as useful to the student; but even the lists themselves, if rightly viewed, can teach us much.

The names and titles of our Lord are not used at random in the New Testament writings. The apostles and evangelists were taught of God even as to their way of speaking of Him whom they make known. They did not speak and write of Him under the first name and title that came to mind, as men have too much done since their day. And so we find that the choice of names and titles used, in each verse of the New Testament where the Lord is mentioned, is always consistent with their meaning. The more we study them the more do we realise the absolute accuracy of

Scripture and the beauty of each name and title. In many instances the words used to designate His person give the key to the meaning of the passage.

Perhaps the most striking lessons to be gained from these lists are those circling round the use of the name "Jesus."

There are many "words of earth" which, being used by the Holy Spirit, have been purified like silver and raised far above their former value. Beyond all other words this name has been lifted out of the sphere of its former usage. It has been purified indeed, and has become precious as gold and priceless and luminous as radium.

The name "Jesus" must have been common in Israel. Many Jewish boys had been named after the great leader, Jesus or Joshua. It was a name "of earth," and this was the name whereby He, the Lord of Glory, was called.

During the days of His ministry He was known to Pharisees and Scribes, high priests and people, and to His disciples, too, by this name "Jesus." But He was never thus addressed. We have not the record of a single instance where even His opponents addressed Him by the name "Jesus" alone. Even they were too respectful. There is one very doubtful case in Luke xxiii. 42 R.V.

After His resurrection, to the little company of His followers He became the "Lord Jesus." It is noteworthy that this title is only used after He rose from the dead (see p. 21). But to the unbelieving Jews, to the citizens of Jerusalem who had murdered Him, the name "Jesus" became a name of scorn. It had belonged to one who had been crucified with malefactors, and when the apostles spoke of Him thus during Pentecostal days, there was evidently a

reference to this fact.. "Jesus of Nazareth" was the title seen by all Jerusalem over the cross.

After a criminal has been executed, his relatives are not eager to proclaim their connection with one who has been hanged. They probably avoid all mention of his name; but the disciples gloried in the fact that they were the followers of the Crucified One, and every time His name "Jesus" rang out from their lips in those marvellous Pentecostal sermons there was evidently a reference to this fact.

This was what the name meant to Saul of Tarsus before he heard the voice from heaven on the Damascus road, and, remembering this, we have a fresh conception of the tremendous import of those words from the glory, "I am Jesus."

But it was not thus that they spoke of Him to one another. He was the Lord, or the Lord Jesus; and when we come to the Epistles, we find that the name is used alone in very few passages. When it is so used, we may be sure that it is always with reference to His life and ministry on earth or His death of shame.

A mere glance at the lists of passages in this connection is an object-lesson in itself. Column after column is filled with the Gospel occurrences of the name "Jesus," and in the Acts of the Apostles there are still a number of passages where He is spoken of thus; but the great contrast between these historical books and the Epistles is very striking (see pp. 5-7, 11-18). It is not a mere question of date, for many of the Epistles were written before the Gospels.

It is suggestive to notice how constantly the apostle Peter speaks of Him as our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ (see p. 28), and it is equally noteworthy to find that Judas Iscariot never once addressed Him as Lord.

From this study we cannot fail to be impressed with the contrast between the inspired writers and "modern" theologians. Who could imagine Saul of Tarsus replying to the heavenly voice that spake to him, "What wilt Thou have me to do, Jesus?"—or who would think for a moment that the beloved disciple, after the vision on Patmos recorded in Rev. i., would ever address as "Jesus" the One at whose feet he fell as dead?

In the present day, unbelievers and those who take the place of the Sadducees and Scribes may speak of Him by this name alone, but those who have had a glimpse of Him in His resurrection power, and recognise who He really is, with full hearts say with Thomas, "My Lord and my God."

The titles of our Lord teach us many things as to what He was, what He is, and what He will be. They speak of His eternal being and His deity; His relationships and His offices; His glory and His inheritance.

Some tell us of His relationship to God, and show that He is Himself God. This is specially true of the expression, Son of God. Others point to His relationship to Israel. He is their Messiah, the Son of David, their King. He is the Christ, the Anointed One of the Old Testament Scriptures; while from his title, Son of Man, the name by which He so often spoke of Himself, we learn His pre-eminence over the whole human race. "He that came down from heaven, even the Son of Man, which is in heaven."

These transcendent truths are the subject of a very important book recently written by Sir Robert Anderson, K.C.B., to which I am greatly indebted.¹ It has been my

privilege to see his chapters in manuscript. They are full of fresh unfoldings of the truths concerning the titles of our Lord, revealing much of the depth of meaning which lies in the familiar words.

While his book was in preparation, and in order to illustrate it, the accompanying lists were made, and, at Sir Robert Anderson's suggestion, I venture to publish them, trusting that the interest stirred by his work will make many desire to study this inexhaustible subject for themselves.

I am much indebted to him for the Preface which he has so kindly written.

I would also express my grateful thanks to E. E. Whit-field, Esq., for his careful revision of the lists with the Revisers' Greek text.
