My dear W. Brown.

I recd a note yesterday from
W. W. Brewster of Plymouth con-
cerning, that as he had taken
all the Stock of his Brother, which
he had originally bought of
W. W. Brown, & had just struck off
an impression of the Papers of
Worship from the Stereotype Plates,
he would be ungraciously dealt
with if I were permitted to other
to reprint the Papers on Worship.

In reply, I have told him that
I should regret that the attempt to
entangle the circulation of the Tracts
in any wise interfered with the fair
& honourable course of trade. But
that the only permission I had
granted was that of Arthur, I had
never received any thing for the
writings, & had purchased them at
the selling price. And that I
had mentioned both to yourself
and Mr Bowley, that I could not
enter into the trade question, but
that you would see to the business

of that. I also added that I
could state both to yourself and
Mr Bewley his (Mr B's) ^{resolutions} / ^{alleged}
guiltance.

I am sure it is our common
desire to provide things honest in
the sight of all men; and that you
all must needs consent to
judge whether Mr B - has any
ground of complaint that I
am. At the same time I have
told Mr B; that I think a re-
vision of the Papers on Worskip to
be needful.
