

# Interesting Notes by F.W. Newman

Evidently a lapse of  
memory on Newman's

"I did not invite Darby to Oxford so far as I remember or believe. I had no means of giving him reception in Balliol College except by inviting persons to meet him in my room for breakfast or tea. I suppose I did so."

But the rumour of his spread fast among Evangelical undergraduates. He had no lack of invitations and of <sup>in no particular City</sup> closetings and consultations. He took others by storm, as he had taken me. The "Lord's" "Coming" was in the air, and George's "Holy Tongue" was about to burst on us. [I think they had not begun.]

4. I do not remember that any one, Anglican or Dissenter, asked <sup>for</sup> H.D. into the pulpit, though he was esteemedly in the Irish Episcopal Church.

5. While I was in Ireland in 1827-8 Darby was an actor <sup>in</sup> a <sup>the</sup> Wicklow woods, keeps a heretic by illness and neglect of his body, to his sister's house where I was living. I do not remember that he had opportunity to "open a Lord's talk", if his mind has reached the desire of it <sup>\*</sup>. Bellet, Corrin, Hatchester, Carr? (or Hallisteron?) and others were the movers for it in Dublin.

6. After my return from Bagdad I <sup>bore</sup> did break bread with the new born sect at Plymouth; but Darby was not there. When I found that I could not do it in <sup>any</sup> of the churches without Darby's disapprobation in <sup>perfect</sup> fashion

I entirely abstained, bemoaning such a calamity would doom off the young, tender, warmly religious, whom I looked on with even affection, in hot and hurtful partizanship, — or bigotry!

7. I never "preached" <sup>away</sup> them; but while at Plymouth I <sup>for the first time</sup> reappeared Rev Mr Harris (the Plymouth Leader) into the villages and with his preaching by the roadside. B.W. Newell was a closely this older friend Harris.

8. I do not believe that Benjamin W. Newell ever left Anglican Orders at all, any more than myself. Do not you confound him with Rev [James] Harris?

Mr Harris was ~~with~~ a great contrast to Darby towards me
