 Lord Congleton (John Vesey Parnell) was brother-in-law to Dr Cronin
 Lord Congleton was cousin to C. S. Parnell Esq. M.P., the Irish leader
 Mr W. Kelly's wife and Mrs Ramsden, of Carlton Hall were sisters, daughters of the Rev H. Gipp, R of St. Peter, Hereford.
 Capt. Wellesley was nephew to the Duke of Wellington, "the hero of Waterloo".
 Mrs W. Kelly and Mrs Ramsden were the daughters of Rev. Hy. Gipp, Vicar of St. Peter, Hereford.
 G. V. Wigram's wife was cousin to Lord Congleton, and aunt to C. S. Parnell. M. P.
 Farnham C. (Close married Miss Wellesley, eldest daughter of the Hon. W. (Capt) Wellesley.
 Dr W. Wolston, Dr Macintosh, Mr H. Glanville (Blackheath) and the two brothers, W. N.
 H. Tomkins (Blackheath) married 5 sisters, the 5 daughters of Capt. Lein.
 Mrs J. S. Oliphant & the Misses Coke of Mansfield Woodhouse are sisters, daughters of Col. E. T. Coke of Trinsley, Derbyshire.
 Sir Ed. Denny's mother was the daughter of an Irish Judge, the Hon. Robert Day.
 The very Rev Archibald Boyd, Dean of Exeter married Sir Ed. Denny's brother's widow.
 Mrs Holgate of Rochdale was the Miss Harris of York, their daughter was married to W. Charles Stanley's eldest son.
 John Methuen (an ex-clergyman, afterwards put away from Ep.) was brother to the first Lord Methuen. His daughter wrote Mrs Arthur Walker's memoir.
 The Ven. Archdeacon of Ardfer in Ireland was Sir Ed. Denny's brother.
 J. L. Harris was son-in-law to Leigh Richmond, ^{of Jersey,} author of "Annals of the Poor." Harris's 2nd wife was Richmond's daughter. She was a widow, having previously married Prof. Fairish.
 Admiral Lord Nelson was "godfather" to both J. N. Darby & his brother Horatio.
 Admiral Sir Henry Darby, who fought in the Nile, was J. N. D's uncle.
 Mrs Wolfe, of the first Plymouth group, was Capt. Hall's mother-in-law.
 Miss Inelawney, of the first Plymouth group, became Mrs P. Mc Adam. She was of a Cornish Quaker family.
 George Darby, Barrister, the Squire of Markley, Sussex & County M.P. was J. N. D's brother.
 The Ven. Dean Darby of Chester is nephew to J. N. D., this brother was Wm. Hy. Horatio, &c.
 Miss Whately, in Ep. in Germany, was the sister of Archbishop Whately of Dublin. [re: vol. post p 189]
 Dr O'Brien (Bishop of Ossery) was nephew to J. N. Darby by marriage to Lord Chief Justice Pennington's daughter.
 Dr Pyle (Bishop of Liverpool) married Mrs Kelly's cousin - Miss Pemberton Plumtree. His son is now Bishop of Exeter. 1901.
 Miss Mary Bewley ("my dear wife's governess" W.K.) afterwards became Mrs Peters. - writer of some hymns.
 Mr Ord's wife was daughter of Colonel Mure, Ayrshire, a Scotch M.P. ("Mure of Cauldwell")
 J. L. Harris's 2nd wife was widow of Prof. Fairish, & daughter Leigh Richmond, author of "Annals of the Poor."
 Mr Sayes (of Haverfordwest) first wife was Mr Gilpin's daughter Alice.
 Mrs J. B. Stoner was the daughter of Mrs Elwood, who was one of "the beautiful Miss Vesey's."
 Mr Alfred Mace is a son of "Jim Mace the pugilist"
 Mr C. C. Stuart of Reading, is of the same family as Mary Stuart, Queen of Scots.
 Mr H. Mackintosh's mother was a daughter of Lady Weldon, of an old Irish family.
 Sir Jonathan Lovett, Bart, of Liscombe, Bucks. was cousin to J. N. D's father, whose sister (J. N. D's aunt), he married.
