Sir Ed. Denby's mother was the daughter of an Irish Judge, the Hon. Robert Day.

The Rev. Archibald Boyd, Dean of Exeter married Sir Ed. Denby's brother's widow.

Mrs. Holgate of Rochdale was the Miss Harris of York; their daughter was married to W. Charles Stanhope's eldest son.

John Methuen (an ex-clergyman, afterwards put away from Ep.) was brother to the first Lord Methuen. His daughter wrote Mrs. Arthur Walker's memoir.

The Ven. Archdeacon of Ardfer in Ireland was Sir Ed. Denby's brother.

J. L. Harris was son-in-law to Leigh Richmond of Tunney, author of "Annals of the Poor," Harris's 2nd wife was Richmond's daughter. She was a widow having no son; she married Prof. Fairish.

Admiral Lord Nelson was "godfather" to both J. N. Darby & his brother Horatio.

Admiral Sir Henry Darby, who fought in the "Nile," was J. N. D.'s uncle.

Mrs. Wolfe, of the first Plymouth group, was Capt. Hall's mother-in-law.

Mr. Ord's wife was daughter of Colonel Mure, Angleshire, a Scotch M.P. ("Mure of Caldwell")

J. L. Harris' 2nd wife was widow of Prof. Fairish, & daughter Leigh Richmond, author of "Annals of the Poor."

Mr. Saye of Haverfordwest's first wife was Mr. Gilpin's daughter Alice.

Mrs. J. B. Stoner was the daughter of Mrs. Elwood, who was one of "the beautiful Miss Vesleys."

Mr. Alfred Mace is a son of "Jim Mace the pugilist"

Mr. C. B. Stuart of Reading, is of the same family as Mary Stuart, Queen of Scots.

Mr. H. Mackintosh's mother was a daughter of Lady Weldon, of an old Irish family.
